ANTARCTIC ADVENTURE

Paragraph 1

As Tony Bullimore, an experienced yachtsman, stood alone on his boat at the beginning of the Vendee Globe round-the-world race, he was impatient to get going. Being at the start line on this cold winter's day was a moment that he had waited for for five years; this was the race that he had always wanted to win, and he was looking forward to the 35,000 km voyage that lay ahead.

Within five days, he was back at the start because he had lost half of his fuel. The boat was repaired, and he set off again, determined to catch up with the others. He continued to have bad luck and problems with his equipment - his satellite communication system broke down, which meant that he was unable to receive weather forecasts.

Paragraph 3

By New Year's Day, however, he had made excellent progress and was in the Southern Ocean, only 900 miles north of Antarctica. When he was hit by the full force of the storm, the winds were blowing so strongly that the waves were as high as six-storey buildings. These include trips to mountain caves or participating in a night safari. Guides are trained not only to share interesting information, but also to make sure the trip goes smoothly and safely. (99)_____ They always keep their finger on the pulse. The only thing you have to do is relax and enjoy your tour.

If you are not convinced yet, think about the people you may meet. Guided tours are designed for groups of similar ages, passions or backgrounds. (100)_____ All you have to do before your departure is find a reliable tour operator that organises guided tours in the country you would like to visit.
